Clerk Iannarone announced adequate notice of this meeting was provided and published in Asbury Park Press and The Ocean Star on January 5, 2018. Copies of the agenda were provided to the newspapers, posted on public bulletin boards and the township website (www.bricktownship.net).

This meeting began with the salute to the flag followed by a moment of silence.

National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week

Mayor Ducey, President deJong, Councilwoman Pontoriero along with Chief Riccio recognized the Brick Township Telecommunicators for National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week. Councilwoman Pontoriero presented the resolution on behalf of the Township Council. Mayor Ducey said the the Telecommunicators in Brick Township are excellent and have received many compliments from the residents. He said every day Public Safety Telecommunicators need to provide consistent excellent customer service and share the goal of protecting life and property while also maintaining the highest level of professionalism under the most extreme circumstances. He presented and proclaimed April 8 – 14, 2018 as National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week.

National Library Week – Brick Branch – Susan Gardiner

Mayor Ducey, President deJong, Vice President Crate recognized the Brick Library for National Library Week. Vice President Crate presented the resolution to Susan Gardiner, Brick Branch Manager on behalf of the Township Council. Mayor Ducey said the citizens of Brick Township are fortunate to have the Brick Branch of the Ocean County Library in the community. He said the Brick Branch is joining approximately 120,000 libraries in the United States in celebrating its 60th Anniversary of National Library Week and presented Susan Gardiner with the proclamation and proclaimed April 8 – 14, 2018 as National Library Week.

Susan Gardiner thanked the Mayor and Council and advised that she is retiring after 28 years of service.

Budget Presentation - Dan Santaniello – Recreation

Dan Santaniello, Recreation Director, explained Recreation, including the township beaches and Trader's Cove Marina, served over 270,000 individuals this past year, through their special events, camps, recreational sports, early childhood classes, beaches and marina. He said the Recreation Department offers over 120 programs for children, adults, and seniors throughout the year and include, but are not limited to, basketball, pickle ball, softball, early childhood education, and camps. He said Recreation also coordinates and manages special events including the Summerfest concert series, Fall Fest, Kite Fest, Movies in the Parks, the Cultural Arts Series including Concerts in the Parks and Drive-In Movies at Windward Beach. He said the Recreation staff plays a key role in the implementation of programs and events hosted by the Mayor's Teen Advisory Committee and they assist in the operation of Lounge 270, otherwise known as the Teen Center. He said the Township lifeguards and badge checkers provide beachgoers with a safe, clean, and well managed beach throughout the summer season He noted they also contract lifeguard services to four private beach associations and are reimbursed for those costs. He said they are professional, well-trained lifeguard staff that has been recognized as one of the best in the area. He said Trader's Cove Marina and Park provides the boating community with a variety of marine services. Trader's Cove has concrete floating docks, transient slips, a double wide boat ramp, Jet Ski ports, kayak/stand up paddle board storage racks, and a large playground. He said this will be the first full summer that the resource building will be in operation. This building has public restrooms on the first floor with a private shower area for our slip customers. The second floor has a lounge area, washer and dryer, and private bathrooms with showers for transient boaters. He advised Trader's Cove Marina and Park, in 2017 they experienced \$153,252.40 in net revenue.

He explained the Recreation staff is comprised of nine full-time and fifty seasonal employees, including Marina staff, camp counselors, and early-education teachers. There was a slight increase in the overall budget due to our commitment to expand the many programs and services they offer to the residents of our town. He said the beach staff consists of part-time employees, including 75 lifeguards, 18 badge checkers, and 10 maintenance workers. He said he salary and wage budget has a small increase due a slight increase in the hourly pay for returning lifeguards and noted they have about 60 guards returning from last year. He said the operating account for 2018 is flat with a 0% increase from last year. The overtime budget also remains flat with a 0% increase. He explained overtime is only used at the end of the summer season when lifeguards begin returning to college and the other staff must cover their shifts, thus working six days a week. This is becoming more challenging each year because the colleges are starting their fall sport workouts a lot earlier than usual.

Budget Presentation - Ken Mathis - Parks Department

Ken Mathis, Supervisor of the Parks Department explained this is a division under the Department of Public Works. He said there are 17 full-time employees that oversee the parks and sports fields and also the grounds at township facilities. There are 20 parks that the employees maintain including ten Basketball courts, eight tennis courts, three bocce courts, three horseshoe pits, three football fields, 15 soccer fields, six miles of bike trails, and 22 softball & baseball fields. He said this past year Hank Waltonowski Memorial Park was renovated and plans for Bernie Cooke and Bayside Park are in the works. He said they also maintain the sports fields including the 40-acre sports complex at Drum Point. He noted this complex is constantly recognized as one of the best in the state. This year they will be hosting the Class C USA Softball Championship for the Northeast. There are four states that hold this Tournament and we honored to be chosen for this event. He said additionally, they manage 392 irrigation zones with 2025 sprinkler heads. There are 147 acres of maintainable grass fields maintained by parks. There are also many intersections maintained by the parks department along with every detention basin in the Township. They also maintain 10 beach/waterfront properties and provide more than 69 acres of lake management. He commented one of their most time-consuming tasks is the annual fall and spring leaf collection which takes 10 weeks – starting at the end of October until the second week in January and then immediately move into Christmas Tree collection for three weeks before moving into the spring leaf collection schedule. He said outside of the daily maintenance of these facilities they also oversee our Lake Management, Fertilization Program, Solar Field Maintenance and Synthetic Field Cleaning. The department is also responsible for set up and breakdown of all events at Civic Center and Senior Center along with

Summerfest, Trunk or Treat and other recreational events. He said they have gladly taken on more responsibilities this year. He said they are currently in charge of the 12-week scheduled leaf pick up and we now also manage brush and leaf pick up all year round and have also taken responsibility for the delivery and repairs of township-issued garbage cans and tree removal is now also Parks responsibility along with all Tax liens. He said the department continues to take on more responsibilities as they move forward in renovating the parks. He commented they look forward to that challenge and will continue to work hard in keeping them safe and enjoyable for all of Brick.

Budget Presentation - Ken Somers - Department of Public Works

Ken Somers – Director of Public Works explained Sanitation Department makes more than 2.7 million stops per year to residents' homes. He said in 2017 they collected 33,570 tons of solid waste and 3,593 tons of bulk and noted they drive over 600,000 miles per year. He said along with all the drainage repairs and replacements, they Utility Crew did an outstanding job getting the beaches ready for the 2017 season and In-house Construction put up a new shed to house the new garbage and recycling cans. He said the Parks Division does an excellent job maintaining all the parks in Town. They also have a Spring & Fall leaf pick up schedule and they deliver the garbage and recycling cans to residents who purchase them. He explained the 2017 capital budget included new equipment that they will be using this year to better serve the residents. He said three major pieces of equipment purchased for the road crew are a crack sealer that the crew will use to seal alligator cracks and a hot patch truck which is highly effective in repairing potholes. He commented any day now they expect to receive the reclaimer, which will be used to turn old millings into asphalt that we can use for minor paving jobs. The Utility Crew appreciates the Council's support of the Capital budget for these pieces of equipment which will allow them to make repairs without the need for an outside contractor. He noted they can do the work faster and more efficiently thanks to the purchase of this equipment. He noted the Recycling Information:

He said Trish Totaro is the Recycling Coordinator who has been working with Ocean County Medical Center to increase their recycling tonnage. They have agreed to partner with us to display the UPCYCLE Projects from the Brick Township students from various schools to commemorate Earth Day. He said Trish has been working with the schools on UPCYCLE projects to be displayed at the Green Fair, hospital and municipal building. He said their goal is to continue to educate residents on the pitfalls of plastic and to emphasize what is and is not allowed in recycling containers and reaching out to Senior Communities for presentation on Pitfalls of Plastic (shopping bag). He said in terms of solid waste, the budget has an overall increase of 2.8% due to the purchase of new recycling cans. He explained the purchase of cans was previously done through the Capital and starting this year, they will budget for the purchase through the Operating budget to replenish the cans as needed each year. He said the Road Department Operating budget has a 18% increase because of a one-time purchase of GPS phones for snow removal. These phones synch with the existing GPS system and allow the drivers to talk directly with the snow monitors and staff at Public Works allowing direct communication for complaints and areas that need attention. He said with Vehicle Maintenance the Operating budget is increasing slightly to accommodate training requests for welding, vehicle diagnostics, fuel pumps and tanks, and heavy duty mechanic classes. He said the mechanics are eagerly anticipating the receipt of a new tow truck. He said this tow truck will allow them to service and tow vehicles without having to call in an outside contractor.

President deJong opened the public hearing on the Budget Presentations.

Recognize National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week – April 8 - 14th

President deJong stated this resolution recognizes the work done by the men and women who serve as Public Safety Telecommunicators for the Township of Brick.

Recognize National Library Week – April 8 – 14th

Vice President Crate said this resolution recognizes National Library Week and all that libraries and librarians do in providing more opportunities for the community by delivering new services that connect closely with the needs of our residents

Recognize Mayor John G. Ducey – The Arc Ocean County Chapter – 2018 Humanitarian Award

President deJong stated this resolution recognizes Mayor John G. Ducey as the recipient of the 2018 Humanitarian Award from the Arc, Ocean County Chapter. She said for 60 years, the Arc has served people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families and are honoring Mayor Ducey along with Mr. Matthew Redmond who will receive the 2018 Heart & Soul Award.

Certification of Compliance – United States Equal Employment Opportunity Commission

President deJong stated this resolution certifies compliance with the United State Equal Employment Opportunity Commission's Enforcement Guidance on the Consideration of Arrest and Conviction Records in Employment Decisions Under Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. She advised this is a requirement by the Division of Local Government Services as part of the 2018 municipal budget submission.

Authorize Receipt of Bids – Roadway Improvements to Holly Hill Cove

Mayor Ducey explained this resolution authorizes receipt of bids for roadway improvements to Holly Hill Cove which includes Holly Berry Lane, Deer Path, Bluff View Drive and part of Tanager Way. He advised this project was included in the 2017 capital budget.

Authorize Receipt of Bids – Roadway Improvements to Birchwood Park – Phase II

Mayor Ducey explained this resolution authorizes receipt of bids for roadway improvements to Birchwood Park Phase II which includes Orangewood Drive, Orangewood Court, Elmwood Drive, Elmwood Court, Elmwood Place, Oakwood Drive, part of Sprucewood Drive, Larchwood Drive and Boxwood Drive. He advised this project was included in the 2017 capital budget.

Authorization for HVAC Services Use of Proprietary Language for Municipal Complex

Councilman Fozman explained this resolution acknowledges proprietary language for HVAC services for the equipment used at the Municipal Complex. He said in 2010 the Township replaced the HVAC system with a new, energy efficient Andover/Schneider system that requires occasional updates and maintenance. The mechanical components of the system require quarterly inspections, maintenance, service or repair from time to time. He said this resolution provides for proprietary language to be included in the bid for services that requires service technicians to be factory trained, certified and authorized by Andover/Schneider for the Municipal Complex HVAC system.

Authorize Receipt of Bids – HVAC Services

President deJong stated this resolution authorizes the receipt of bids for HVAC services as discussed for a specific system at the Municipal Building.

Authorize Award of Bid – Summerfest Food Truck Vendors

President deJong stated this resolution awards a bid for Summerfest food truck vendors in six categories: Tony's Italian Sausage- \$1,082.00 for hot food including sausage and cheesesteak; John & Debbie O's - \$1,116.00 for grilled/friend items; John & Debbie O's- \$1,616.00 for ice cream; Shore Shake - \$1,000.00 for specialty beverages; John & Debbie O's- \$1,016.00 for miscellaneous snacks and My Three Cobs Corn Roasting- \$853.00 for miscellaneous snacks. She advised a notice to bidders was placed in the Asbury Park Press and on the Township web site. In addition, 84 bidders were notified from the bidders list of which ten potential bidders requested bid packages. Six bids were received. She said the Township established a minimum

bid of \$750.00 per category. She noted this resolution also authorizes the Re-Bid for the remaining two categories to include Category 1 for pizza and Category 4 for deli (salad, sub sandwiches, tacos and wraps).

Authorize Award of Bid – Beer & Wine Garden Concession

President deJong stated this resolution authorizes the award of bid for beer & wine concession to Three Boys Corporation t/a the Windward Tavern, in the amount of \$6,150.00. She advised there was an established minimum bid rate of \$5,600.00 to provide this service at the four (4) Summerfest events and the Fall Fest Event. She said a notice to bidders was mailed to 28 potential bidders of which two requested a bid packet of which two bids were received, and one was rejected for failing to meet the minimum bid requirement.

Authorize Award of Bid – Aerial Fireworks Exhibition

President deJong stated this resolution authorizes award of bid for aerial fireworks to J&J Computing, also known as Fireworks Extravaganza, Rochelle Park, in the amount of \$19,995.00 (\$3,999.00 per event) for five (5) fireworks displays. She noted events include the 2018 Summerfest and Fall Fest events. She said two bidders picked up bid packages and one bid was received.

Authorize Award of Bid – Ice Cream Truck Vendor at Windward Beach & Traders Cove

President deJong stated this resolution authorizes the award of bid for an ice cream truck vendor to Muscle Pizza in the amount of \$802.00. She noted the Township established a minimum bid of \$500.00 for exclusive rights to both locations or \$250 for either location. She explained in this contract, the vendor agrees to visit each park daily from Memorial Day to Labor Day. She advised a notice to bidders was placed in the Asbury Park Press and on the Township web site. In addition, 84 bidders were notified from the bidders list of which two potential bidders requested bid packages. Two bids were received with Muscle Pizza being the highest bidder. She advised the Business Administrator and Recreation Director inspected the fleet of ice cream trucks and confirmed the vendor's ability to offer a wide variety of ice cream and cold drinks.

Authorize Re-Bid – Ice Machine Concession at Traders Cove Marina

President deJong stated this resolution authorizes the re-bid of an ice machine concession at Trader's Cove Marina. She advised two potential bidders were notified but no bids were received during the initial solicitation.

Authorize Re-Bid – Supply & Operate ATM Machine

President deJong stated this resolution authorizes the re-bid of an ATM machine at township facilities. She advised nine potential bidders were notified but no bids were received during the initial solicitation.

Authorize Re-Bid – Fall Fest Food Vendor Concession

President deJong stated this resolution authorizes the re-bid for a Fall Fest food truck vendor. She advised two potential bidders were notified but no bids were received during the initial solicitation. She said a notice to bidders was placed in the Asbury Park Press and on the Township web site. In addition, 84 bidders were notified from the bidders list of which two potential bidders requested bid packages, but no bids were received.

Authorize Award of Contract – One Towable Boom Hybrid Scissor Lift w/Accessories through NJPA National Cooperative

Councilman Fozman explained this resolution authorizes the award of contract for the purchase of a Towable Boom Hybrid Scissor Lift and Accessories through the NJPA National Cooperative in the amount of \$60,810.80. He said the NJPA has awarded a contract to Terex USA, Waverly, IA, who will work through a dealer network for which this equipment will be purchased from United Rentals, Wall, NJ. He advised the scissor lift was funded in the 2016 capital budget and will be used by the buildings & grounds department.

Authorize Placement of Tax Liens for Property Clean ups

President deJong stated this resolution authorizes the placement of a tax lien in the amount of \$325.34 at 130 Woodland Drive.

President deJong stated this resolution authorizes a special events permit for a Kentucky Derby Hat Party event on Saturday, May 5th between the hours of 3:30 and 6:30 pm at Beacon 70.

Ordinance on First Reading: Amend Metedeconk Village Redevelopment Plan

Clerk Iannarone read the title of the Ordinance into the record.

Mayor Ducey explained the scope of the Metedeconk Village Redevelopment Plan is to begin the process of revitalizing the former Foodtown site, a dilapidated and underutilized property in the heart of Brick. He said that plan was developed to outline the objectives and standards by which the redevelopment of the site will be accomplished and amending the Plan is necessary to allow for the site to be developed for a dual use that features an indoor sports, recreation/community facility in the rear of the site with retail in the front. He said both developers have been identified and are working together on a concept plan that will be presented to the Council and the Planning Board. He advised the Redevelopment Plan is essential in identifying the best uses for the site, which facilitates the sale of the property and the site plan applications which will come next. This amendment is a huge step towards the development of the property with ideal uses that enhance the community by removing an eyesore and replacing it with great projects that provide the residents with yet another opportunity for connectivity with one another and activities for families.

Ordinance on Second Reading: CAP Rate Index Ordinance

Clerk Iannarone read the title of the Ordinance into the record.

President deJong explained this allows the Township to establish a cap bank for future use. The ordinance allows for increases to budget appropriations, and allows the township to bank any unused monetary room. This cap bank ordinance allows the Township to increase budget appropriations by 3.5 percent over the prior year's appropriations, and to bank any unused appropriation room for the next two succeeding years. She advised the ordinance is simply precautionary. It is not funded through a tax increase, since it is only used in subsequent years should they need to fund a one-time expenditure. She said the only time in recent years the Township used this was to fund emergency response for Super Storm Sandy. She advised they are not generating cash; they are creating the ability to raise money should they need it. If the funds are not needed in the succeeding two years the bank simply is dissolved.

President deJong opened the public hearing on the Ordinance.

Clerk Iannarone read the title of the Ordinance into the record.

President deJong explained this ordinance is being introduced as per a recommendation from

the Council's Public Safety Committee. She advised residents of Winding River Village have repeatedly requested that Skyline Drive be added to Township Code Section 288-42 Schedule XII: Through Streets. This designation will allow for the installation of Stop signs at roads intersecting with Skyline Drive, which is the main thoroughfare through Winding River Village. There is also a small side street off Skyline Drive at the entrance (also known as Skyline Drive) which they are requesting be officially deemed a one-way street. It is currently being used as a one-way; however there is no signage in place. She noted residents know it's used for a one-way but some guests and visitors do not which creates confusion.

President deJong opened the public hearing on the Ordinance.

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF BRICK, COUNTY OF OCEAN,
STATE OF NEW JERSEY AMENDING CHAPTER 288 AND ESTABLISHING
VARIOUS TRAFFIC REGULATIONS APPLICABLE TO SKYLINE DRIVE**

President deJong opened the public hearing portion of the meeting.

John Sluka, 950 Sylvia Court read his letter regarding the parkway construction project and the environmental impact on Evergreen Woods with this project.

Michele Spector, 808 Jenny Court, mentioned she sent a letter to the Governor's office requesting a representative from his office visit Evergreen Woods.

Rich Campbell, 48 Bretonian Drive W, asked that an ordinance similar to Toms River that passed last year on landlords/rentals having co's revoked or suspended for renting to someone that is convicted of a crime or an offense during the time of living at a rental property. He explained the situation in his neighborhood.
